There are different forms of behavior that is considered sexually exploitive to boys under the age of eighteen.

Offenders can be male or female. They can be parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins, teachers, rabbis, baby-sitters, camp counselors, family friends, etc.

Types of Abusive Behavior:

- * An adult sexually touching a child (*fondling, oral sex, penetration*).
- * Having a child sexually touch an adult (*fondling, oral sex, penetration*).
- * Having child sexually touch another child (*fondling, oral sex, penetration*).
- * Stripping a child for spanking or punishment.
- * Photographing the child for sexual purposes (*pornography*).
- * Inappropriate talk about sex and or sexual experiences.
- * Showing or providing pornographic material to a child under the age of 18.
- * Inappropriate talk/ridicule about child's genitals or sexual development.
- * Inappropriate exposure of genitals to child.
- * Masturbating or being sexual in front of a child.
- * Being sexually aroused when watching a child undress, bathe, etc.
- * Watching a child over five undress, bathe, etc.
- * Verbal/emotional abuse of a sexual nature.
- * Having a child witness others have sex/be sexually abused.
- * Engaging a child in prostitution.
- * Having the child be sexual with animals.

Men and Boys Can Be Survivors
of Sexual Violence.**

Statistics:

About three percent of American men — a total of 2.78 million men—have experienced an attempted or completed rape in their lifetime. [*Prevalence, Incidence and Consequences of Violence Against Women 1998.*]

In 2002, one in every eight rape victims were male. [NCVS 2002]

Three percent of boys in grades five through eight and five percent of boys in grades nine through twelve said they had been sexually abused. [Commonwealth Fund Survey of the Health of Adolescent Boys, 1998.]

Of sexually abused children in grades five through twelve, 48% of the boys told no one about the abuse—not even a friend or sibling. [Commonwealth Fund Survey of the Health of Adolescent Girls, 1998.]

In one study, 98% of males who raped boys reported that they were heterosexual. [Sexual Abuse of Boys, Journal of the American Medical Association, December 2, 1998]
